PUBLIC POLICY NOTES

The Maryland Assembly finished their session recently, although they are being called back to complete work on budget matters. 791 bills have been passed during this session with 96 passed during the last week.

Some of the bills include:

1. The "Flush" tax - The cost of sewage will double from \$30 per month to \$60 starting in July. This tax is

being used to fund sewage treatment upgrades and Chesapeake Bay restoration activities.

2. Counties will have to adopt a "Tiered" system to limit housing developments served by septic systems especially in areas dominated by farmland and forestland.

3. One hundred years late, Maryland will ratify the 17th amendment to the United States Constitution that established the popular election of US senators.

4. The Maryland constitution will be amended to force public officials to immediately resign from office when they plead guilty or are convicted of a felony or certain misdemeanors related to their public duties.

5. Children will have to stay in school through age 16 starting in 2015-2016 school year. Presently the age is fifteen. In the 2017-2018 school year, the age will increase to17 - meaning students could not drop out until turning 18.

6. The estate tax will be reduced for people who inherit family farms as long as they use it for farming purposes.

7. Fees will be reduced for possession of small amounts of marijuana. A person convicted of less than 10 grams of marijuana will face a maximum jail term of 90 days and/or a maximum fine of \$500.

8. The list of cancers that firefighters and rescue squad are presumed to have suffered in the line of duty will now include multiple myeloma, non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, brain cancer, testicular cancer and breast cancer.

9. Legislation was passed to automatically relieve child support payments while the parent is incarcerated.



SAFETY Seat Belt Laws



Maryland law requires every driver and front seat

passenger next to a door to wear a seat belt, regardless of their age, and everyone younger than 16 must wear a seat belt, regardless of where they sitting in a vehicle. State law also requires children to use booster seats until they reach the age of 8, a weight of 65 pounds or a height of 4 feet, 9 inches, whichever occurs first. In addition, children under the age of 16 may not ride in an unenclosed bed of a pickup truck.

HOW TO MAKE EVERY WEEK POISON PREVENTION WEEK

In 1961, Congress enacted National Poison Prevention Week to be celebrated the third week of every March. However, we believe poisonings can be prevented 24/7, 365 days a year. Shockingly, 90% of all poisonings occur in the home, which is the one environment you would think people had the most control over. A poisoning is when someone swallows, breathes, touches or is splashed in the eye with a substance that can cause sickness or death. Yet not all of these substances are in and of themselves poisonous. An adult may take an aspirin to ease some pain, but when a two-year-old ingests a handful of pills thinking they are candy, it can result in much more than a headache.

Here are some poison-prevention tips:

• Keep all cleaning products out of sight and reach of children; install childproof safety latches on cabinets.

• Store food and household cleaning products in separate areas.

• Keep products in their original, labeled containers, and read those labels prior to use.

• If the phone or doorbell rings when you're in the middle of using a product, close the bottle or box. Many incidents happen when adults are distracted.

• Wash hands thoroughly after using a product, and, likewise, wash any utensils that may have been used to measure or dispense a product.

• Turn on fans or open windows when using household and chemical products for proper ventilation.

• NEVER combine cleaning agents with ammonia. Some chemical mixtures can create deadly fumes.

• Do not use empty cleaning-product containers to store food, and, likewise, never use cups or baby bottles to store detergents or cleansers.

In case of an accidental poisoning or emergency, call the number listed on the product label or call the U.S. Poison Control Center's toll-free hotline at 800-222-1222.

Baked Pork Chops and Apples

Prep Time: 30 minutes **Total Time:** 1 hrs 30 minutes **Servings:** 6

Pork chops and apples are great together and so was this pork chop bake. Served buttered brown rice, broccoli, rolls and enjoyed!

Ingredients

- 6 boneless pork chops
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1 1/2 teaspoons crumbled dried sage
- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- 3 granny smith apples (or other tart variety, sliced 1/4 inch thick)
- 3 tablespoons maple syrup
- 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 2 cups chicken broth
- 1 tablespoon vinegar
- 1/3 cup golden raisins

Directions

- 1. Using salt and sage, season pork chops evenly on both sides. In a large skillet over a medium flame, heat the vegetable oil and brown pork chops on both sides. Transfer chops to a shallow baking dish and save pan drippings.
- 2. Peel, core, and slice apples layering them over pork chops. Drizzle the maple syrup over the apples slices.
- Sprinkle flour over the pan drippings that were saved and cook until brown, stirring occasionally. Add chicken broth and stir constantly until mixture is smooth. Bring to a boil, stir in vinegar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and raisins. Pour mixture over the pork chops and apples, cover pan with aluminum foil, and bake at 350 degrees for 50 to 60 minutes.
