What Are the Symptoms of Food Poisoning?

Generally, food poisoning causes some combination of nausea, vomiting, and diarrhea that may or may not be bloody, sometimes with other symptoms.

• Abdominal cramps, diarrhea, and vomiting, starting from one hour to four days after eating tainted food and lasting up to four days, usually indicate bacterial food poisoning.

• Vomiting, diarrhea, abdominal cramps, headaches, fever, and chills, beginning from 12 to 48 hours after eating contaminated food, particularly seafood, usually indicate viral food poisoning.

• Vomiting, diarrhea, sweating, dizziness, tearing in the eyes, excessive salivation, mental confusion, and stomach pain, beginning about 30 minutes after eating contaminated food, are typical indications of chemical food poisoning.

• Partial loss of speech or vision, muscle weakness, difficulty swallowing, dry mouth, muscle paralysis from the head down through the body, and vomiting may indicate botulism, a severe but very rare type of bacterial food poisoning.

Call Your Doctor About Food Poisoning If:

• You recognize symptoms of botulism or chemical food poisoning.

• The vomiting or diarrhea is severe and lasts for more than two days. You are at risk of becoming dehydrated.

Do Not Delay – Pay Today! NEW

ACWW News

Water and Polluting



Water and pollution was the topic of conversation at the 26th

Triennial Conference in Hot Springs Arkansas in 2010, where a resolution was passed stating that all ACWW Member Societies should urge their communities to restrict the use of plastic bags and reduce excess packaging.

The 2010 Triennial Conference also established that consumers needed to be informed about and governments need to offer incentives for voluntary recycling and encourage the use of biodegradable bags and packaging.

For many years, water pollution has been an international concern. The focus on safe water and water conservation has highlighted the major risks due to the high levels of medical waste and blocked water pipes by plastic sheeting and entanglement of marine animals with debris.

The School of Ocean and Earth Science and Technology at the University of Hawaii at Manoã conducted a study in 2008 proving the debris (plastic) dumped in the oceans of the world spread to the Pacific Ocean, specifically between Hawaii and California in the northern hemispheres and also in Waster Island in the Southern Pacific Ocean.

The areas in the northern hemisphere have recently been identified as the location of a great floating garbage patch, a huge cluster of partly defragmented plastic and other flotsam. The marine debris problem was recognized in 2005 by the UN General Assembly (UNGA). Although a number of countries have taken some steps to address marine debris, the problem keeps growing.

Through increasing public awareness and proper solid waste disposal as well as increased recycling efforts, marine debris can be decreased. ACWW members and member societies are assisting globally in fighting the war against public wastage. By adhering to the call of UNGA and insisting consumers make use of reusable materials other than plastic for packaging and use reusable material such as shopping bags, ACWW members can make a huge difference by creating public awareness in the over use of plastic.

Iron Rich Foods Can Fortify Your Blood

Iron deficiency (sideropenia or hypoferremia) is one of the most common of the nutritional deficiencies. Iron is present in all cells in the human body and has several vital functions. Examples include as a carrier of oxygen to the tissues from the lungs in the form of hemoglobin, as a transport medium for electrons within the cells in the form of cytochromes and as an integral part of enzyme reactions in various tissues. Too little iron can interfere with these vital functions and lead to morbidity and death.

The direct consequence of iron deficiency is iron deficiency anemia. Groups that are most prone to developing this disease are children and premenopausal women.

Total body iron averages approximately 3.8 g in men and 2.3 g in women. In blood plasma, iron is carried tightly bound to the protein transferrin. There are several mechanisms that control human iron metabolism and safeguard against iron deficiency. The main regulatory mechanism is situated in the gastrointestinal tract.

Symptoms of iron deficiency can occur even before the condition has progressed to iron deficiency anaemia. Symptoms of iron deficiency are not unique to iron deficiency. Iron is needed for many enzymes to function normally, so a wide range of symptoms may eventually emerge, either as the secondary result of the anemia or as other primary results of iron deficiency. Symptoms include:

fatigue, pallor, hair loss, irritability, weakness, pica, brittle or grooved nails, Plummer-Vinson syndrome: painful atrophy of the mucous membrane covering the tongue, the pharynx and the esophagus, impaired immune function, Pagophagia, and Restless Legs Syndrome.

Because iron is a requirement for most plants and animals, a wide range of foods provide iron. Good sources of dietary iron include red meat, poultry, insects, lentils, beans, leafy vegetables, pistachios, tofu, chickpeas, black-eyed peas, fortified bread and breakfast cereals.
