### **PUBLIC POLICY NOTES**

The recently concluded 2009 Session of the Maryland Assembly passed some bills it has been considering and left many others for another year. Any bills not passed this year will have to be reintroduced in the next year's session. Among those passed but not yet signed by the governor are:

- ➤ Bill that would allow judges to take firearms from people accused of domestic violence.
- ➤ Authorized speed cameras statewide in work zones and school zones.
- ➤ Bill limiting death penalty to those cases with DNA or biological evidence, a video confession or a videotape linking the subject to a homicide.
- ➤ Bill to require waterfront homes to upgrade failed septic systems to curb pollution in the Chesapeake Bay.
- ➤ Bill to make it a misdemeanor punishable by a fine up to \$500.00 to write or send a text message while driving.
- ➤ Passed legislation requiring teens to hold a learner's permit for nine (9) months instead of six (6).
- ➤ Bill extending unemployment insurance to part-time workers.
- Approved a bill ending illegal immigrants access to drivers' license those holding licenses to get a driving permit that will expire in 2015.

## NEWS FROM THE VICE PRESIDENT FOR PROGRAM

Presidents' Reports Show Maryland FCE's Interests

It was a pleasure reading the county presidents' reports for programs and activities for the 2008 program year. WOW! While it is not possible to share everything I'll attempt to share some of the highlights. Perhaps your county will discover some new interests for 2009 and 2010.

Jane Wagner, reporting for Allegany County, that \$750 was presented in scholarships from FCE. Programs presented represented a variety of educational programs and fun activities. Members learned about healthy foods with a demonstration by members of a stir fry entree and spinach salad. Their FCS educator presented a program on heart health. The programs included information from the Hearth Fire Series: # 8, "Educating for Good Health" and # 35, "Here's to a Healthy Heart." Members learned about China at the International Luncheon and enjoyed a tour of the area including the Road Kill Cafe--now that is something I would like to see!

Anne Arundel County's Thelma Gore reported on nine programs presented in 2008. FCE members presented five of those programs. They learned about taking Small Steps to Health and Wealth from the FCS educator. At their meetings they discussed ways to market FCE, the importance of voting, and 85 ways to save money and energy (from the area electric provider). Two members presented a program on how to be prepared for natural disasters. These busy people learned a lot about cooking shortcuts. Four of the members prepared quick foods--now the members have more time for FCE! AA County invited a Maryland Delegate to discuss bills in the Assembly.

Reporting for Carroll County, Joan Antonio described five programs reaching 115 members during the year. The FCE educator led one of the programs, "Is Our Food Safe?". BGE showed the members how to be more "green" with tips on how to save energy. The sheriff's department presented a program on pedestrian safety. Two scholarships of \$500 each were given to local high school seniors. The Character Counts program reached 4 Carroll County schools with 130 fourth grade students participating. Cash awards were given to the first, second, third and honorable mention

winners. The local newspaper covered the program with lots of pictures.

Cecil County spent most of their time planning and implementing the regional meeting held in Colora and the annual conference held at Sandy Cove. At the regional meeting a local FCE member invited former county commissioner Phyllis Kilby to share her family's dairy farm story of starting an ice cream business.

After much training and attending the ice cream course at Penn State Kilby Cream is now a successful business. Everyone was treated to some of the delicious ice cream with wonderful homemade cookies--made by FCE members of course. Two talented people from Cecil charmed the members at the annual conference: author Cathy Gohlke shared her story of becoming a writer and Jack Foreaker entertained the group with his puppets and his singing.

Michelle Close, president of Frederick County FCE, reported on the activities of 2008. Members participated in the county fair by demonstrating how to make potato candy and hard candy. They also showed folks at the fair how to make homes environmentally safe. Their educational programs included learning about bees and honey, Treat the Troops/Operation Shoebox, therapy dogs, 10 warning signs of Alzheimer's, and craft demonstrations. Here's an idea—invite a FCE member from another county to share a program. Jeanne Purich and Maddi Klein of Montgomery County FCE traveled to Frederick County to share the Treat the Troops and Operation Shoebox activities.

Speaking of Jeanne Purich...Jeanne presides over Montgomery County FCE and sent pages of fine program and activity reports. The county programs included "Books, the Other Channel", "Here's to a Healthy Heart", "The Healing Power of Food", "Someone's in the World Being Green", "Someone's in the Kitchen Cooking for One or Two"--all of these programs are based on Hearth Fire Series. Other interesting programs rounded out the year. The well-known Linus Project is a success due to the participation of 177 FCE members and 417 others. Figuring six hours per volunteer the total volunteer hours on "Linus" is 3.552! Additionally the county supports 3 scholarships totaling \$2,250 and 2 scholarships to members totaling \$400.

Prince George's County FCE president is Glenna Burgess. She reported on a project called "Give a Sick Child a Smile!" making pillowcases for young cancer patients. They contributed 50 pillowcases this year. Hearth Fire Series programs presented this year included "Bone Breaking Facts", "Healthy Snacks", "Household Records" to keep along with managing finances, "Making Concoctions", "The Cyberhighway-Friend or Foe", "Books, the Other Channel" and "Basic Cooking Techniques/Mind Your Manners" in preparation for Thanksgiving. This county hosted a regional meeting and members learned more than they ever knew about outhouses! These busy women contributed 3,142 hours for FCE Activities.

You can tell Maryland FCE members are educated and active. They have contributed HOURS of time, lots of money, tons of energy to FCE and other programs and activities. For certain-the state is a better place because of our members! Thank you--all of you.

Pennies for Friendship Could Thrive on the Price of a Loaf Of Bread

### **Real Care Imposes Real Costs**

Treasurer Anphia Grobler works alongside the monetary roller coaster that governs the activities of organizations like ACWW.

The financial insecurity of the world right now has an influence on everyone reading this, on each of our member organizations and, of course, on ACWW itself. Although this makes all of us insecure, it is nothing new. History proves that even ACWW has gone through tough times.

Mrs.Godfrey Drage launched the Pennies for Friendship plan in 1936. She was a founder member from Whales and chairman of the finance committee at the time. The idea was that every member in every ACWW society would give the smallest coin of her county once a year in addition to her society dues. Today we know that the value of the smallest coin of even the strongest current is

eroded, but we can still make a similar plan work for us!

Before we look into implementing this in a changed world, we have to ask: Why do we need the Pennies for Friendship Fund?

As a charity, we receive money for projects from societies and members ACWW is very proud of what has been achieved over almost eight decades. Money for projects needs to be "mobile". ACWW is like a big ship loaded with goods to be taken abroad-but there is not enough fuel to run the engines.

The need for additional income to administer ACWW is as essential as donations towards projects.

How can we bring Pennies for Friendship in line with current times? The use of the word "pennies" is symbolic. Today, in most countries, a penny or other smallest coin will not buy anything and, of course, there is no standard cost of living across the world. What costs a few pennies in one place may cost many more in another.

A few years ago it was suggested that each member donate the price of a loaf of bread toward ACWW's Pennies for Friendship fund. Is it too much to ask this again? Each country would have a goal relating to its own cost of living.

This is an opportunity to give hope to someone out there who might never have the pleasure of running water, access to a vegetable garden, a business to provide financial security, or maybe the opportunity for their children to go to school.

I urge you: encourage all members to donate the cost of a loaf of bread in their own currency towards the Pennies for Friendship fund of ACWW and help us make a success of the projects we finance. By being involved in this way, there is the reassurance that money given for projects is not without a structure to administer it effectively.

Looking at the history of ACWW, Pennies for Friendship can be seen as a tradition with a worthy outcome. If you are not yet an individual member, why not sign up and be directly involved in this charity? Receive *The County*woman personally and be informed about projects, the progress of "Pennies" and the other work of ACWW.

Marie Moeller did our first, very informative and requested program on training within FCE. It was well received and very educational. Please don't forget the newbie's within your organization so they hopefully don't feel as lost as we did as newbie's. The second program had an advance warning sent out, to bring your sweet tooth and we passed insulin out at the door for those in need. The program started out with a lecture on "The Health Benefits of Chocolate: Can Chocolate Benefit Your Health?" and followed with dipping into chocolate anything Margie and Sharon could think of and the Clinton police department allowed [giggle, giggle]. We received magnets that said, "God sends no stress...that chocolate and prayer can't handle" and we were shown how to make kissy fish from various size foam hearts for our valentines, picture frames that held our sweetheart's picture from the small conversation heart boxes and computer generated magnets. We give out 2 scholarships a year to college students in any educational discipline. Applications are being sent to 25 local high schools, screened in committee, and sent to the school of choice to be used for books and tuition. Our Sue Van Slyke belongs to the Capitol Hill Presbyterian Church at 4th and Independence St SE in DC. She, Sharon Adamoyurka, Alicia Rausch and Debbie Rausch all learned a great deal about sewing while helping Sue with her project. Sue had 15 dresses - 13 hand sewn and 2 store bought, and 1 little boy's outfit, store bought. The outfits go to the Capitol Hill Group Ministry and are given to little girls in their homeless program. She had 3 little girls model for the Fashion Show on Palm Sunday - one did not show up - and had 1 little boy for the purchased boys outfit. All the dresses were modeled, even though the models had to wear 3 or 4 dresses each and in a couple of cases the dresses were really too big for the models. But everyone seemed to have a good time and the mothers and fathers of our models seemed to be very proud of having their little ones wearing such pretty dresses. Anyone interested in helping next year is more than welcome in partaking in such a worthy project.

We are still working on our on-going project, "A Case for Smiles" benefiting Conkerr Cancer Center. We are always interested in helpers, material or donations for material and want to thank those that already have supported us with this worthwhile project. We have several members of

the St. John Seniors in our group and have formally requested their assistance for the above and welcomed anyone who was interested to come join our group and it should be quite promising.

Another on-going project of collecting tin cans with proceeds benefiting the Baden Food Pantry can always use help from anyone that wants to **save for** us and donations of food and money is collected at each meeting.

And lastly, everyone is crocheting various 12 x 12 blocks for crazy afghans to be given to our veterans through the Knights of Columbus via Debbie Rausch. Participating in all these worthy projects leaves us with an unexplainable feeling in our hearts. We ended the meeting with sewing pillowcases, dresses and making Leprechauns that held large shamrocks for verses to be printed with well wishes.

### **Ham and Sweet Potato Salad**

### Ingredients:

1 bag (5 oz) baby spinach

1 lb sweet potatoes, peeled, halved lengthwise, then cut crosswise in 1/4-in.-thick slices

8 oz green beans, ends trimmed, beans cut in half (2 1/3 cups)

2 tsp vegetable oil

8 oz thick-sliced Canadian bacon, cut in strips 1 red onion - cut in thin wedges 1/3 cup honey-Dijon dressing

#### **Directions:**

- 1. Line a serving platter with spinach.
- 2. Bring 1 cup lightly salted water to a boil in a large nonstick skillet. Add potatoes and beans, cover and cook 5 to 7 minutes just until potatoes are fork-tender (be careful not to overcook or potatoes will fall apart). Drain potatoes and beans.
- 3. In same skillet, heat oil over medium heat. Add bacon and onion; sauté 5 minutes or until lightly browned and onion is tender. Spoon over spinach along with the drained potatoes and beans.
