

PUBLIC POLICY NOTES

Bills awaiting Governor Hogan's signature

1. Artificial Insemination

Gives female couples the same benefits for artificial insemination as heterosexual couples.

2. Augustine Commission

These bills were meant to improve the state's business climate. One bill would examine how public universities could make money by selling the findings of their research. Another would require some state employees to take customer-service training.

3. Body Cameras

Exempts the wiretap rule that allows police departments in the state to wear body cameras. Regulations for county and cities are developed.

4 Voting rights for ex-felons

Voting rights provided for about 40,000 ex-felons on parole or probation. The district and 13 other states presently allow ex-felons to vote after they are released from prison.

5. Hotel Tax

Online travel services that offer discounted hotel room prices will have to pay the same amount of state sales tax which is 6 %.

6. Marijuana

One bill repeals the mandatory minimum sentences for non-violent drug offenders who have committed a second offense. Another bill decriminalizes the possession of paraphernalia such as bongs and pipes.

7. Second Chance Act

People with certain non-violent misdemeanor records will be able to have their records blocked from public view after 3 years under specific conditions. This is to make it easier for those with criminal pasts to get jobs.

8. Speed Limit

Bill will allow state transportation officials the authority to raise speed limit from 65 mph to 70 mph.

9. Transgender birth certificates

This bill requires the state's health officials to issue new birth certificates for transgender and intersex individuals after documented sex change.

10. Uber

This bill makes share-riding booking services legal in Maryland after the District and Virginia approve frameworks for the app-based car services.

DID YOU KNOW THAT TYLENOL CAN DAMAGE YOUR LIVER?

ACETAMINOPHEN, the drug that is the ingredient in Tylenol, is also present in over 600 over-the-counter (OTC) and prescription medications. Liver damage in most cases occurs because of over-dosing accidentally or by design. Problems can arise if a person (1) drinks alcohol while taking this drug, (2) uses it while pregnant, (3) uses more than one product containing acetaminophen, thus exceeding daily recommended dosage, or (4) takes it in combination with other drugs that brings about dangerous interaction. THIS IS WHY YOUR DOCTORS NEED TO KNOW ALL MEDICATIONS YOU ARE TAKING.

Liver damage has become so common that it leads to over 100,000 phone calls to poison control centers, over 60,000 ER visits and many deaths each year. Damage to the liver due to improper use of Tylenol is now the leading cause for liver transplants in the U. S. and abroad. Liver damage or failure because of acetaminophen poisoning should not be taken lightly.

However, Tylenol (or acetaminophen) is safe if used responsibly. Continued long term use of this drug should be under the guidance of your health care professional.

ACWW News

Safe Water and Safe Health



This project has been implemented by the volunteers and staff of the Mother Theresa Rural Development Society (MTRDS). Throughout the duration of their project titled 'Safe Water and Safe Health' the following was carried out:

- MTRDS organized awareness camps in the target villages, at which beneficiaries were identified and selected, after which MTRDS conducted group meetings in the target villages, where the need for awareness training of sanitation and the use of defluoridation water filters was identified.
- MTRDS set up self-help groups (SHGs) where members of these were encouraged to pay in 50 Rs each per month into a microcredit savings account. Once this account is built up, they can then apply for a loan in order to start an income-generating activity, such as sheep or goat rearing or a ladies clothes shop etc.
- 66 women took part in results-based management training. They learned how to visualize results, process documentation and facilitate meetings. They are using these in their community activities including savings and credit programs.
- 16 beneficiaries received a grant for the construction of a household toilet.
- De-fluoridation water filters were installed in two villages. These plants are being maintained by the women's SHGs'. One woman has been employed to be in charge of each plant. The entire population of the two villages is benefitting from the safe water produced as a result of these plants.
